ith 53 CTs in attendance, we had a quorum for our April 29 Membership Meeting.

Our Executive Board is required to govern the union according to our constitution *except* when we have a quorum of members at a regular or special meeting. In that case, the members govern. [Kristen Rule]

At the April 29 meeting, the members passed a resolution in support of a minimum wage increase in Michigan (see page 4) as well as approving \$44,600 to replace the parking lot and drain basins at our union hall. The members also voted

companies couldn't justify paying women less based on the argument that women traditionally earn less under the "going market rate," effectively wiping out the claim that a wage differential was justified "simply because men would not work at the low rates paid women."



ere at home, 1974 was the year that MSU clerical and technical workers were recognized as a bargaining union. [Denise Rabi]

We called ourselves Michigan State University Employees Association back then, and we went directly to work fighting for a contract.

And what a contract it was. It provided substantial raises and benefit increases, a fully developed grievance procedure ending in binding arbitration, an excellent layoff mechanism, a union shop that would secure our financial concerns, and a provision for a classification system.

I think a lot of people forget—or don't realize—that, without a union and without a contract, workers are not entitled to negotiate wages and benefits or defend ourselves against arbitrary, capricious or malicious managers and decisions.

That's why those CTs in 1974 rallied in support of a union—after the employer decided to withhold a scheduled \$60 per year raise.

n the years since 1974, we have faced many challenges and learned from both our mistakes and our successes. We continue to build on the foundation laid by the CTs in 1974.

And now, after 40 years of sacrifice, hard work, solidarity and triumph, it is time to take a short break, have a good time and enjoy each other's company!



Township, leaving the dollar amount subject to the approval of the Executive Board. The members directed the Board to fund the parking lot projects from the contingency fund. [Audrey Smith]

The meeting focused on CTU's finances. Certified Public Accountant Jim Nyquist presented the audit for 2013 and said we had, once again, received a "clean opinion" of our financial statements, meaning that our finances are presented fairly and conform to generally accepted accounting principles. CTU Treasurer Jan Wallace presented the 2013 budget.

President Deb Bittner discussed several issues including our upcoming picnic and CTs' participation in Project 60/50+40.

Winners of the door prizes: Jan Wallace and Jean Lepard each won \$50, Julie Stoner won a CTU laptop bag, Sierra VanDenHeuvel won a CTU lunch bag, and Walt Peebles won a special Workers Memorial Day Prize.

CTU resolution in support of increasing the minimum wage:

- Whereas a decent minimum wage is essential to a healthy society and economy, and
- •Whereas, when adjusted for inflation, today's minimum wage is worth \$2 less than in 1968, and
- •Whereas every worker deserves the right to a living wage and a voice on the job, and
- Whereas poverty wages are exploitation that damages the economic and social well being of all who work, produce and benefit from a healthy society, and
- •Whereas historically the CTU has supported raising the minimum wage to a level that moves working families out of poverty, therefore
- Be it resolved that the CTU will support efforts to raise the minimum wage and tie future increases to at least the level of inflation.
