President's corner "If not now, then when? If not us, then who?"

Day is January 18, 2016. Please note that it is *not* a paid holiday for MSU employees. Classes will be canceled but we are expected to report to work.

A day"on"

For decades the union has tried to bargain a paid holiday at MSU to acknowledge the formal commemoration of the birthday of Martin Luther King Jr.

We have been unsuccessful so far.

Instead, we have won our employer's written agreement to encourage departments to let employees participate in events that foster diversity and inclusion, including events associated with MLK Day. (See "Know your contract," p. 4.)

Rather than a "day off," this arrangement creates a "day on"—an opportunity to contribute to and seek inspiration for making our university a place that truly respects, values, supports, and benefits from our differences, an organization that is committed to protecting civil and human rights. If you are denied a reasonable request to participate in an event associated with MLK Day, contact the CTU for support in working out a mutually agreeable arrangement.

"From misery and despair" to "hope and progress"

MSU's theme this year—"If not now, then when? If not us, then who?"—is an especially poignant sentiment for organized labor these days as we watch rights for which workers fought and died dismantled across the country, especially here in Michigan.

Make no mistake, King supported

workers and advocated for strong unions. He understood that it was through unions that workers had a voice on the job and the ability to negotiate decent working conditions and wages that would keep us out of poverty.

In fact, King was in Memphis to support AFSCME sanitation workers the day before he was assassinated in 1968.

In his 1965 speech to the State Conventions of the Illinois AFL-CIO, he said:

"The labor movement was the principal force that transformed misery and despair into hope and progress. Out of its bold struggles, economic and social reform gave birth to unemployment insurance, old-age pensions, government relief for the destitute and, above all, new wage levels that meant not mere survival but a tolerable life."


If not us, then who?

The CTU shares King's belief in the importance of unions, both for members and for society, and we affirm our commitment in our Mission Statement:

"The Clerical-Technical Union of Michigan State University (CTU) is committed to the empowerment and dignity of the individual; democracy; diversity; and social justice through pursuit of fair wages, safe and humane working conditions; and the right to have a voice in decisions that affect CT's lives. CTU's mission is to empower its members to exert control and choice over their own

lives. . . . These aims are based on a foundation of values which include the affirmation of human dignity, respect for diversity, and promotion of social justice."

CTU, as an organization and through individual members, has a rich history and heritage of caring about human needs, justice, fairness and opportunity. We give resources—talents, time and dollars—to improve our community and help others. Many of these resources are available, in large part, because of the success of our union.

strong and historical advocate for diversity and fairness, especially in our workplace, the CTU encourages members to participate in local events commemorating the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

The conversation continues

MSU's theme for this year's commemoration, "If not now, then when? If not us, then who?" continues the conversation about civil rights and human rights that was launched as part of the 60/50 project in January 2014. The 60/50 project recognized the major impact on our society of two legal milestones: 1) The Supreme Court's 1954 Brown v. Board of Education decision that ended "separate but equal" 60 years ago, and 2) the passage of the Civil Rights Act 50 years ago in 1964. [Deanna Hubbell]

Noting that 2014 was also the 40th anniversary of the founding of CTU and recognizing King's union advocacy —the CTU took special care to make sure that labor rights were part of the civil and human rights discussions.

Although the 60/50 project was set to culminate with MLK Day in January 2015, the conversation was not over (and, really, should never be over), and people have continued to come together to listen, discuss, and take action.

Plenty of opportunities will be available to join in the conversation and participate in events during the 2016 MLK Day and throughout the year.


From the letter of agreement between CTU and management (p. 73 of our contract):

"The Union and the Employer share the goal of identifying ways in which MSU can promote diversity and inclusion across campus. Support of participation in Martin Luther King, Jr. celebration activities is one way to meet this goal.

"The Employer agrees to encourage flexibility for employees who desire to participate in sponsored events to celebrate Martin Luther King, Jr. Day as well as other opportunities to increase sensitivity to diversity and inclusion."

So, contact your union if you are denied a reasonable request to participate in an event associated with MLK Day.

Since we are discussing diversity and inclusion, it's important to point out



another relevant section of our contract. From Article 4, Fair Employment Practices:

I. The Employer and the Union are committed to a policy of non-discrimination on the basis of race, color, sex, religion, creed, national origin, age, political persuasion, sexual orientation, gender identity, marital status, and disability."

This event, hosted by the Lansing Area Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Holiday Commission, is held downtown at the Lansing Center beginning at 11 a.m. This year's theme is "True Peace is not Merely the Absence of Tension, but the Presence of Justice."

Although not part of MSU's activities, several CTs have enjoyed attending these luncheons over the years. This year's luncheon looks especially interesting. Ambassador Young worked alongside Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and was a key strategist and negotiator during the Civil Rights Campaigns in Birmingham and Selma that resulted in the





passage Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

He was elected to the U.S. Congress in 1972, the first African-American elected from the deep South since Reconstruction, and served two terms as mayor of Atlanta starting in 1981.

In 1977, President Carter appointed him to serve as the nation's first African-American Ambassador to the United Nations, where he negotiated an end to white minority rule in Namibia and Zimbabwe and brought Carter's emphasis on human rights to international diplomacy.

President Jimmy Carter awarded him the Presidential Medal of Freedom and France awarded him the Legion d'Honneur, the greatest civilian honor in each nation.
